An Update From Will Hood

Beloved, by the time you read this I will probably be on a plane headed to the Eastern edge of Africa. In December I had the opportunity to make a site visit and see some of the region where I will be working. I was able to go to Djibouti and to Addis Ababa Ethiopia. It was a whirl world wind visit. To say that my head is still spinning would be an understatement. The area is so complex and the work has so many levels that it seems overwhelming at times. As Dorothy told Toto in the movie, "The Wizard of Oz"; "Toto, I don't think we are in Kansas anymore." Indeed I was confronted with the truth that I am being taken away from what is familiar and it feels a bit uncomfortable.

So many times we are faced with a challenge or unfamiliar situation and our response is to either flee or just try harder. However, as I have been pondering this change in my life I have realized once again that I must start with prayer and humility. I remember how I felt when I first began my work in New Orleans. I was overwhelmed and many days just plain scared. However, one of the lessons we share is how important prayer, patience, and trust in Christ is. I think one of the most important things we did together as a parish was the prayer vigil that Holly Abbott and Margaret Kirn helped organize. I remember all of the hope, love, and trust that came from that for me and for many of you. Together we have learned that it's o.k. to be challenged and stretched even if our weaknesses show because as St. Paul reminds us it is in our weakness Christ that makes us strong.

My prayer for all of you is that during your time of transition is you pray more and worry less so that the love, grace, and care of Christ can shine through each of you.
Know you are continued in my prayers.

Nursery

Our nursery is available every Sunday for all of our infants, toddlers, preschoolers, and Kindergarten children. Children can play some fun games and music planned for Sunday mornings. Parents have the option of taking a "beeper" with them to church – if your child needs you, we'll "beep" you – no need to worry all through church.

Grades 1 – 5

As many of you already know I am in the diaconate process here at St. Paul's. Part of the process is to actively engage in a field project dealing with a social ministry. My project for diaconate class is working with the men's recovery program at Bridge House twice a week. I am fortunate to be working with The Rev. Francis King whose experience and professionalism have been wonderful to observe and they serve as a great example for me. I assist Father King in this program and have come to know many of the men and something of their stories.

Fr. King instituted a movie night on Mondays showing movies with life's lessons as their theme. We have an active discussion at the conclusion of the movie and the men offer meaningful observations regarding what they have seen, and how they relate the movie topic to circumstances they see as a common thread running through so many of their lives.

On Tuesday night we lead a healing service. Everyone feels comfortable sharing their needs and praying for one another. I have had the opportunity to lead this service a couple of times while Francis was out of town and I received positive feedback which was encouraging. In getting to know these guys I have realized how little we are different from one another. I believe it is that realization which has made me feel comfortable with them and them with me.

In studying the AA program I have become more knowledgeable about the anatomy of addiction and understand that there is no stereotypical addict. I have also learned and observed the concept of participants helping and counseling one another. A "newbie" to the program is encouraged to seek the support of those who have been involved for a longer period of time. It is uplifting to see these relationships in action.

I feel privileged to be involved with this program. The experience has increased my sensitivity toward victims of addiction and has enabled me to speak with love and understanding to those in need. I would like to ask the congregation for some assistance with a coat and sweater drive for Bridge House. A few of the men have adequate coats but many have to borrow one or just have a light jacket and that's not enough. If you could please look in your closets and bring any unused coats or sweaters to mass on the next few Sundays, I will bring them down to Bridge House and distribute them to those in need. Thank you for all of your support.

The Music Corner

Happy New year everyone!

Sincere and tremendous thanks for all the choirs have done during the Advent and Christmas season. It is a great joy to be working with you. Thanks also for Natalie's fine work during the busy season balancing concerts and services! Many thanks to Myers and the St. Paul's School recorder quartet, bell ringers, and choirs. You all were FANTASTIC at the Feast of Lights service on January 6th.

As we approach the new year and the Lenten season together, I'd like to hear from you about some of the facets of our program. Congregational hymns are my first discussion. I believe hymns are sung prayers and truly a part of our service. The traditional service that we follow is called the choral Eucharist which implies a lot of singing! In picking the hymns, I strive to choose familiar ones that coincide with current lessons and time of year, etc. Sometimes, a "new" or unfamiliar hymn might pop up in addition to a more familiar one that same day. Please try it!! Please consider holding your books or sharing with someone who doesn't have one! As prayers, these are corporate pieces of worship and help connect parts of the service. The choir is not there for performance, in fact, that is far from what we strive to accomplish. "Performing" only happens a few times per year for specific reasons. In the context of a service, we are there to lead the hymns and service music and provide a message, a prayer, or an interpretation of a scripture through our singing. Leading sometimes ends up being hard when some folks are just standing there staring at us with an expression of "let's get this over with" on their faces! (only a few!) Remember that we can see you as we sing and as you sing!

I realize that singing might seem extremely scary to some and that some days are just not made for singing when you need to hear someone else sing words that are difficult to express for various reasons. Sometimes you SHOULD just stop and listen. I did that Christmas Eve when I heard you singing "Silent Night" – it was SO beautiful!!!! I'm not scolding you because in fact, MANY of you sing all the time! I'm pointing out that since we're all there only once per week together for a short time, the bit of worship we get in must be truly worship which shouldn't consist of fear of participation! Singing should not be toilsome. EVERY voice has a place and every person can usually follow an easy melody. If a "weird" hymn is picked, feel free to listen until you think you can grab a tiny bit or.....just simply read the prayer along with us and share your hymnbook with someone who doesn't have one. I will never judge your voice, the choir will never judge you, and we will always be there for you, to help lead you. So, with all that said.....give it a try :) Our tradition is one of singing and we are singing with all those who have gone before us. It connects our humanity throughout, the ages. Singing is giving of yourself, don't be afraid to share yourself in the welcoming community of St. Paul's!

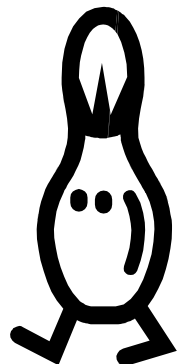
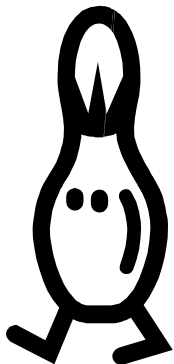

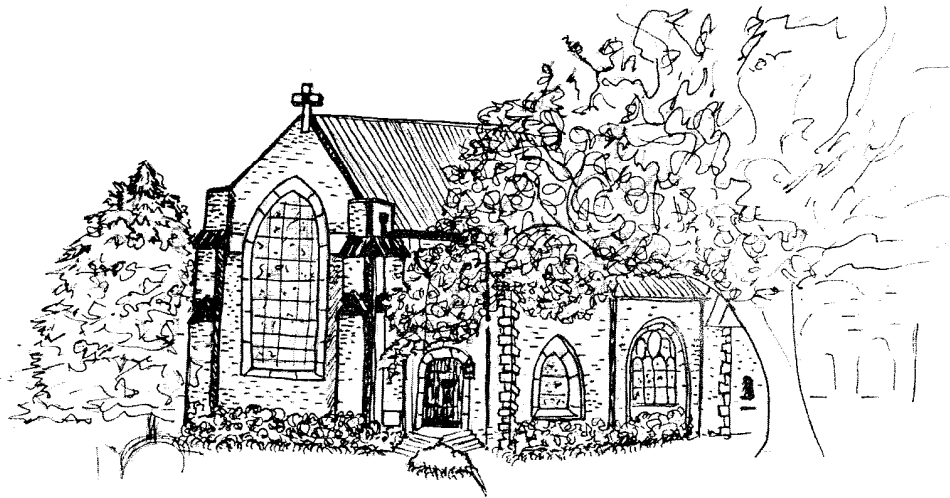
